

the image), felt pen, coloured pencil, mixed media are some ideas to use.


A template will be made available to download from the Community Chat or pick it up from the Seer Green School Office and the Jordans School Office.



Our Living Village: The Godolphin estate map

This is the earliest map of Seer Green. Often referred to as the 1753 map, it dates from 1802. Much of what is illustrated is familiar today: principal routeways; field pattern; woodland; village centre around a green (but no church until 1846); with names listed indicating to whom properties belonged, including "Four Cottages on the Wast for the use of the Poor." The map is surprisingly accurate, reflecting progress made in surveying practices during the Georgian period.

Frances Godolphin purchased lands in Seer Green from Thomas Coke. Earl of Leicester, in 1752 and had John Richardson draw up this map, on parchment, the following year. Looking closely (examine it in more detail at www.ourlivingvillage.org) a few things stand out. The shape of the 1866 civil parish (in 1753 the "Hamlet" was still a detached part of the "Manor of Farnham" Royal") is clear, but detail in the west is missing as it was not part of Godolphin's purchase. Across this area is written "Land belonging to James Dupree Esq." (and other "fundry perfons"), but Dupree was not born until 1778!

The mapped 1753 field boundaries are marked with coloured hedges ("laid on ye Lands to which they belong"), and the fields are coloured indicating land use: purple (faded to pink) is arable; green is meadow.

Across the central portion of the map amendments were made in 1802 using Indian ink (faded to brown), with tenants listed in margin notes. Godolphin died heirless in 1785 so this must have been updated after his estates were dispersed.

A particularly nice aspect is that the fields have names (we will return to this in a future article), many of which have been preserved in our modern road names.

Autumn on the Allotments

Liz's allotment flowers cheered us all through the summer and she richly deserved a first prize for her Dahlias.

Remember Remember Frost can kill in November! (So can lighting your bonfire before checking for hedgehogs.)

If any readers followed last November's 'what to do with fallen leaves' suggestion you can now use that leaf mould as a mulch in your winter preparations, how quickly a year goes by. We will have gathered in our crops but for the winter veg, and cleared dead leaves from around the brassicas so as to deter mould etc. Some of us will clear the ground and some will cover to deter weeds, let us all leave some cosy nooks and crannies for insects, cocoons and other wildlife, so that all may safely overwinter.

Jordans wins Fisher-Ryman Cup

The Chairman of the Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition, Carol Hayward, has awarded the Fisher-Ryman Cup to Jordans.

This new Cup was awarded for the first time last year (to East and Botolph Claydon) to recognize a village or town that has not won a cup in the last ten years (although we did win the Leofwine Shield for Best Kept Village in the Chilterns in 2019!) but who have consistently entered and promoted the values and objectives of the Competition.

Our Parish Councillor Jackie Lomas and JVL Treasurer Bob Barber were also on hand to enjoy the celebrations. Well done Jordans residents!

By choosing to wear a skirt for ceremonial duties rather than trousers, Countess Howe Lord-Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire, is spared from carrying a sword as part of her ceremonial dress. A sword can be a nuisance, as one of her predecessors remarked!

In her official role, the Countess has visited Seer Green twice within a fortnight, this time to tell us how the role became part of English history and the relevance it has in the 21st century. There have certainly been some colourful characters throughout history who have held the position in Bucks since the initial

appointment of the first Lord-Lieutenants back in 1545, although the Office wasn't recognized by Parliament until 1549.

History shows us that incumbents across the shires have been unpopular and powerful. Henry VIII demanded loyalty and made his own appointments from those with wealth and status. Tudor Monarchs used them as a strength of force to provide indirect rule; unpaid recruiting sergeants standing as the Monarch's representative on the Battlefield.

These days the appointment process is more transparent, with the consultative process instigated a year before the present incumbent departs office. An appropriate candidate is sought who has shown commitment and; service to the local community, whether through business or the voluntary sector. Countess Howe is Buckinghamshire's first female representative. Once she had been chosen and accepted, her name was put forward to the Prime Minister, who took her name to the Monarch. She is King Charles' representative in the County with a duty to uphold the dignity of the Crown.

The Countess wanted to follow in the Royal Family's spirit of co-operation, and to engender a good atmosphere. She has embedded this, not least through her presidencies/patronages across the county, and by the presentation of medals and awards to local people.



A new academic year and some new activities for our children to enjoy. On a Friday morning we are very excited to introduce 'Fun flip Friday.' The session is led by our qualified dance teacher and includes a climbing frame, balance beam, air tracks, tunnel, a wedged mat for rolling and plenty of mats for floor work.

The children are always keen to get started and it is wonderful to see them challenging themselves, developing their coordination, balance and strength. Initially many preferred a steadying hand when traveling across the balance beam, but after doing this a few times they are now happy to try it without any help. It is great to see their confidence grow, and to see them having so much fun.

We are also enjoying learning some Spanish words and phrases and learning a little about life in Spain. Gardening thoughts from Seer Green Gardeners

At the time of writing this, we are looking forward to gardening national celebrity Matt Biggs' talk in the Jubilee Hall. His topic: perfect plants for problem places, which we chose from a plethora of options, seemed timely for November when the soil is usually still warm enough to move things around or to plant new acquisitions. There's usually still warmth in the soil in November so not a bad time for taking up some of his suggestions for 'perfect plants for problem places'. Contact us for the low-down if you weren't able to attend on 14 October.



Other gardening suggestions for lifting the spirits at this often gloomy time of year!

- If you have photos of your 2025 spring garden, check them out for locations which could benefit from the splashes of colour that autumn planted bulbs produce. Take a look at the DeJager website for new inspiration.
- Remove any saucers beneath pots and raise them onto pot feet to avoid damaging water-logging.
- Move any pots containing tender plants to somewhere warmer, or protect them with old bubble wrap - if you don't have any, post a request on the SG&J Buy and Sell (or give-away) WhatsApp group.
- It's easy to accumulate lots of woody prunings at this time of the year.
 Instead of donating it to the Council via a green bin, chop it up and mix it in with the softer 'green' waste in your compost bin by creating more air spaces it works like a compost activator.
- A wildlife-friendly 'dead hedge' is another great idea for tree and shrub prunings - lots of useful info on YouTube!
- The charming yellow flowers pictured this month are called 'Bidens' and were blooming through November last year. Somewhat invasive but if you'd like some plants, contact Sally at the email address below.

Janet's Book Reviews



Heft – Liz Moore

Heft was recommended to me by a friend, and I'm so pleased I listened! It's one of those novels that stays with you, I've found myself thinking about it often.

At its heart, it's about unlikely connections: Arthur Opp, a reclusive former academic who hasn't left his house in years, and Kel Keller, a teenager juggling baseball dreams with the heavy weight of his mother's struggles. Their lives are worlds apart, but Moore draws them together with warmth and honesty, showing how even the loneliest people can find unexpected connections.


Moore has a great ability to make you care deeply for her characters—flaws and all. If you're in the mood for something beautifully written and moving without being too saccharine, Heft is a novel well worth a read.



This book will be in my Top 5 of the year – I loved it as I have all of this author's books.

Told across two timelines, it follows four teenagers—Joar, Ted, Ali and Kimkim—who escape difficult home lives by clinging to each other and dreaming big on a weather-beaten pier by the sea. That summer, their friendship sparks the creation of a painting, The One of the Sea, which ends up changing all of their lives.

Louisa, an eighteen-year-old foster kid grieving her best friend and carrying a battered postcard of that very painting. When fate places the painting in her hands, she sets out with Ted to uncover the secrets behind it, piecing together a story of love, loyalty and regret. It's heartfelt, funny, and quietly devastating - a gorgeous exploration of how friendships shape us. Put it on your list!



The Artist - Lucy Steed

Lucy Steed's debut novel is the sort of book that makes you want to pack a bag and head straight to Provence. Set in the 1920s, the story centres on Ettie, who's spent her life looking after her eccentric, reclusive, famous painter uncle "Tata" Edouard Tartouffe. Joseph, a curious young British journalist arrives, and suddenly secrets start spilling faster than the wine on the table.

I loved the author's descriptions - you can practically taste the food and smell the turpentine! Steeds manages to balance mystery, and romance, wrapped up in beautiful writing in a stunning setting.

A lovely book, perfect for the darker Autumn evenings.


